Immaculée Ilibagiza was recently in Pittsburgh to share her powerful story of faith, forgiveness, and healing. Best known for her book, "Left to Tell: Discovering God Amidst the Rwandan Holocaust," Immaculée survived the Rwandan genocide by hiding for 91 days in a small bathroom with seven other women while over 500,000 people, including her family, were murdered. Her story of resilience in the face of extreme trauma was inspirational! Our home was honored to meet Immaculée prior to her visit to St. Bernard Church in Mount Lebanon. While her visit to the home was unexpected, it was a blessed moment for all the Sisters and Residents!
